Dear Ms. Graham:

This is in response to your Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request for copies of records maintained by the Department of Justice Criminal Division (CRM). The CRM located in their files records that originated with the Executive Office for United States Attorneys (EOUSA). Within these records, the EOUSA located records that originated with the Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP) and referred 2 pages of records to this agency by FOIA request number EOUSA 2019-004699 for a release determination.

After careful review, we determined 2 pages are appropriate for release in part. Pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552, the CRM applied redactions to the records under exemptions (b)(6) and (b)(7)(C). The EOUSA applied redactions to the records under exemptions (b)(5); (b)(6) and (b)(7)(C). The BOP separately applied redactions to the records under exemptions (b)(5); (b)(6) and (b)(7)(C). The BOP separately applied redactions to the records with sticky note identifier of "BOP."

5 U.S.C. § 552(b)(5) concerns certain inter- and intra-agency communications protected by the deliberative process privilege, the attorney work-product privilege, and/or the attorney-client privilege.

5 U.S.C. § **552(b)(6)** concerns material the release of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy of third parties.

5 U.S.C. § **552(b)(7)(C)** concerns records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes the release of which could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy of third parties.
